

The Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007 (BAM Act)

- Controls the entry, establishment, spread and impact of organisms including weeds
- Independent panel undertaking first 10-year review
- Learnings from modern biosecurity acts introduced since BAM Act
 - Risk-based or Principles-based legislation
 - Management of weeds particularly widespread and established in modern biosecurity legislation (NSW, QLD, Tasmania) is different to the BAM Act

General biosecurity duty/obligation

Any person who deals with **biosecurity matter**, who knows or ought to know of a biosecurity risk, has a duty to ensure the risk is prevented, eliminated or minimised, so far as is reasonably practicable.

The GBO applies to;

- all plants, including national, state, regional and local priority weeds
- · all people who interact with them
- · all activities relating to them

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Species declarations

BAM Act deals with organisms and activities

- Prohibited organisms
- Declared pests
- Permitted organisms
- Range of import, movement and keeping requirements for each

Modern biosecurity legislation deals with biosecurity matter and dealings

- · Prohibited matter
- · Restricted matter
- Permitted matter
- Any type of dealing with biosecurity matter
- · Benefit of application to non-organisms

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Planning and coordination mechanisms

- Particularly important for established species where concentrated and ongoing effort is required
- Need for greater state-level and regional coordination, and provision of local mechanisms
 - · Wider collaboration is needed
 - Strategic and accountable process for prioritisation and resource allocation
 - Remove barriers to local and regional control programs
 - · Support innovation and cost-effectiveness
 - · Support outcomes and activities rather than groups
- Supported by recent UN/IPBES report

Determining weed categories in NSW

- State Priority Weeds are prohibited matter
- Preliminary Weed Risk Assessment for suspect plants
- If 'yes' to all assessment questions, plant listed for high priority assessment and prioritisation
 - NSW Weed Risk Management System,
 - · Biodiversity Priorities for Widespread Weeds System

Guiding principles

Protect Priority Sites

Manage Weeds

Manage Sites

Management actions determined using NSW Weed Risk Management System

- · Tool that evaluates weed species
- · Assumes only existing control practices
- · Allows for the calculation of uncertainty
- · Weed risk criteria
 - 1. Invasiveness
 - 2. Impacts
 - 3. Potential distribution
- · Feasibility of coordinated criteria
 - 1. Control costs
 - 2. Persistence
 - 3. Current distribution



Funding weed management in NSW Weeds Action Program

- State level sub-programs
 - 1-5 years in length
 - · has state-level strategic significance and benefits
 - · may require infrastructure or system development
- Regional sub-programs
 - 3-5 years in length
 - involves multiple stakeholders in a Local Land Services region
- Innovative sub-programs
 - an occasional competitive funding stream
